MIDDLE & HIGH SCHOOL LOTTERY

The school choice lottery for incoming middle school and high school students will take place on Tuesday, March 7. The school choice lottery placement announcements will be sent home to families via Skyward followed by a letter in the mail. Thank you to all our fifth and eighth grade families for turning in your school choice forms and participating in the process!

EARLY RELEASE DAY MARCH 15

This is a friendly reminder that all schools will have their next monthly two-hour early dismissal on Wednesday, March 15, for teacher professional development. Middle school families should note that this is different from the regular Wednesday dismissal time for middle school students. This allows buses to run on time for other schools that are also dismissed early that day. Families should also remember to double check the schedules at local recreation centers, as some may not open until 3 p.m. because of staffing.

FIRST-EVER PPSD AFRICAN AMERICAN STUDIES COURSE

Starting next school year, high schools in the District will be offering an African American Studies course for 12th grade students as an elective course. The course will cover centuries of content, including Ancient Africa, Africans in the Atlantic World, Role of African Americans in the Civil War, the Harlem Renaissance, Barack Obama Presidency, and much more. Juniors who are currently choosing classes for next year are eligible to sign up for the class for next year.

First Grade Dual Language English Teacher Located in: Leviton Dual Language School Joined PPSD in: 1987

"I saw this as an opportunity for children to keep not only their language and their cultures, but to affirm their cultures and affirm their languages while being able to learn English."

What made you want to be a Dual Language English teacher?

I started in Providence as a long-term substitute in 1987, and I was hired permanently in 1991. I was in a first grade classroom at Gilbert Stuart, which was an elementary school at the time, and it's actually the only position I've held. I feel it's the year where kids really learn more such as reading, writing, and the social skills they have to learn.

Dual Language was not around at all at that time, and at Gilbert Stuart, we had Meredith Costa as our principal, and she was a pretty far-thinking principal. The District had come to her with interest in establishing a Dual Language program, similar to what was being done in Massachusetts. She came to me and asked if I would be interested in partnering up with the bilingual teacher. At the time we had five English first grade classes and one bilingual first grade class. So I said yes, I thought it was a great idea, I loved the idea, and I've been there ever since.

How would you describe your job to people who don't work in education?

I explain to them that we are teaching English, but we're also enabling the children to keep their first language, their home language, and instructing them academically in that language, and what a bonus that is for them. People are really amazed when they stop to really think about what we're doing. It's a very challenging job for the children, for their families, and for the teachers, and when people stop and think about what the children are doing, it really amazes them.

I saw this as an opportunity for children to keep not only their language and their cultures, but affirm their cultures and affirm their languages while being able to learn English, and really utilize that as they get older and go out into the workforce.

What do you wish more people knew about being a Dual Language teacher?

I think people are afraid of being a Dual Language teacher because they're afraid that it's going to be a lot of work, and I'm not going to say that it's not a lot of work because it is. But I wish people knew the excitement you feel, the satisfaction that you feel when you see a child who may be a Newcomer, and see them acquiring English at such a rapid rate. But they're still able to hold onto their native language, and vice versa, to have a child who comes in that is monolingual in English and to hear them start to speak in Spanish. Then as the years go on, we're very children in the day. It's not just 26 first graders, it's 52 that you're managing. We split the day in half, half the day is in English, half the day is in Spanish and we do that for a five day cycle. Then we flip-flop. So then the children who did literacy in English will do literacy in Spanish for five days.

As a teacher, I wish I could tell more teachers that what you're doing really matters and it really counts. To have parents and families come to you when their children are leaving fifth grade and say how much they appreciated all that our school has done for them, that's really special.

What have been some highlights this year so far?

The highlights for me are just seeing the students grow. The students we have in first grade this year were particularly hit strong by COVID. Before they came to kindergarten, 99.9% of them had no exposure outside of their homes, and to see how they've grown socially first, and emotionally, to watch that growth is really exciting for me. Those are the real highlights, and adding in the academics, the lightbulb goes off and somebody's starting to read, somebody feels confident about writing, that's special too. But the real highlight is to see how these children are coming out of COVID and starting to function in the world, and feeling good about it, you know, not being afraid to come into the building, and not being afraid to be with other kids, and playing, and learning to share.

What are you looking forward to for the rest of the year?

It's a little bittersweet for me, as I'm retiring at the end of the school year. Every time I do an activity or something I've done successfully for a lot of years, in the back of my mind it's, "oh, this is the last time I'm going to do this, the last time I'm going to do that." But I'm looking forward to seeing how far I can take these students, and preparing them for second grade, and preparing them for being out in the real world. We do a lot of fun things, we have a garden and I'm looking forward to planting the garden again in the spring, and we always try to catch the leprechaun in March. The things that kids remember are what I'm looking forward to. I have lots of kids come back from middle school, high school, and even from college in their cap and gown.

I'm really honored to say that I was a teacher in Providence for pretty much my entire career. We have wonderful students, wonderful families. I teach with the best colleagues that I could have ever asked for. My daughter began teaching in Providence this year. She grew up her entire life coming to school with me, and when she was in high school, she did a practicum in a special needs classroom that we had at Leviton at the time, and that's where she got her passion for working with kids with special needs, and she's come full circle. I just want people to know how proud I am of being a part of a wonderful group of families, students, and colleagues.


