This week brought exciting news for the future of our district. Voters in Providence approved a \$125 million bond to invest in our schools, and voters statewide approved a \$250 million school construction bond that will also greatly benefit Providence. This gives us the opportunity to upgrade buildings that have gone ignored for decades, and turn them into modern learning facilities.

I truly believe that the next five years will reshape the Providence Public School District as we know it. We can move past Band-Aid fixes and get our students and educators into the 21st century schools they deserve. Right now, just 5% of our school buildings are rated as high quality facilities for learning. That's unacceptable, and it shows the lack of investment that has been made in our city's schools for generations.


DISTRICT UPDATES

This is a friendly reminder that all schools will have their next monthly two-hour early dismissal on Wednesday, November **16**. for teacher professional development. Classical Spirit Week



STAFF SPOTLIGHT

Get to know the amazing people who work with our students every day!

November 7th to the 11th is National School Psychology Week. What does that mean to you as a School Psychologist?

This year's theme is "Together We Shine," and I think that really speaks to the power in partnerships. We can't improve, build, or provide a more supportive environment if we don't do it together. Our community is full of so many smart, committed professionals in Providence. So, this week is an opportunity for our field to let everyone in the community know who we are, how we can be a resource, and bring more connection to the supports that is available.

What do you hope people learn this week?

I think there is a misconception that School Psychologists or similar support staff only work with certain groups of students. But I have an open-door policy and I try to get to know as many

students and staff as possible. I want them all to know they can come to me, bring a friend to me, a parent can reach out, you name it. We're a great resource no matter what the situation and if we don't know, we will help steer you in the right direction. School Psychologists wear many hats. I also want people to know it's a wonderful profession to go

into, and there's absolutely a need. As challenging as my role can be, I work with a wonderful set of psychologists, teachers, and support staff. I'm not a native Rhode Islander but Nathan Bishop and PPSD have always felt like home to me. Many of the staff I've worked with and continue to work with are committed to our students' futures and our community. We even have students lead the pledge in the morning, to set that tone for younger kids.

How would you describe the day-to-day of being a School Psychologist?

It's a little bit of everything, for sure. My colleagues and I laugh - we start the day with a plan, but often it ends up totally different! My best days are when I have my feet on the ground and I'm working with kids. That could be private counseling,

modeling behavior in the classroom, conducting an assessment, running a group or having a restorative conversation. I also set aside time each day during the lunch block to run my quiet lunches for each grade. It's a part of the day where students come to escape the hustle and bustle of the lunchroom. We recently got a GoFundMe approved for games during this time. We called it "Boards for Bored Students" and the kids are thrilled to have all these classic games to interact with. I also spend a lot of time checking in on students to encourage them throughout their day and talking with teachers about classroom management, support plans and general ideas for interaction.

What do you wish more people knew about the job?

We have a lot more awareness as a society about supporting mental health and social-emotional needs these days, but not

enough action and teaching of what that actually looks like. I want more people to know that School Psychologists can partner with parents, teachers, and students to build those skills. The pandemic really challenged everyone and made it so we're seeing more students with anxiety and relationship issues. There are staff like me who are trained and ready to provide those supports in a proactive way.

What are some moments you can share that reminded you why you do this work?

Those moments come often! Sometimes it's a smile from a student who doesn't do so often or a hello from a student whose name I finally remember because I say hello every day. Earlier this year, a social worker at Hope High School called me and said she met a young man I had at Nathan Bishop. During middle school he struggled a great deal. I worked with him every day as a steady support. And the social worker said to me, "he's in 10th grade now, and he wanted me to call you and say thank you. You helped him feel his feelings and manage them, and he said if it weren't for you, he wouldn't be ok now."
