We have to be patient with one another, meet people where they are, and create experiences for them that will serve as a mental model and bridge for understanding. Over the next few months, we will be offering learning opportunities for members of the PPSD community, as well as community members, to come together and learn together so that we can begin to gain a common understanding. 





