SUPERINTENDENT'S CORNER

Welcome to the latest edition of the Providence Public School District (PPSD) biweekly newsletter! If you or someone you know misses any of our newsletters, you can find past editions on the District's website in multiple languages.

Our number-one focus in Providence is improving outcomes for our students. Re-committing ourselves to that goal is more important than ever, with the massive impact the pandemic had on students and learning loss over the past several years.

Maybe the most well-known measure of student progress is the Rhode Island Comprehensive Assessment System, or RICAS. With our latest round of testing, we're proud that almost all PPSD elementary schools made improvements in RICAS math scores in 2022, compared to 2021.

In fact, PPSD has already recovered roughly 60% of math learning loss in elementary and middle schools compared to the 2019 RICAS results. Make no mistake, these scores aren't nearly good enough, and we must continue to make

improvements. But it's important to know that we're stabilizing after the pandemic and building the progress we want to see.

Beginning next week, families across the District will receive hard copies of their students' RICAS Individual Score Reports (ISRs) from the spring of 2022. Hard copies will be sent home with each student by their school. There is a new QR code that will provide a personalized video about your child's score, in the language that you speak at home! Please review your child's information on their English Language Arts and math assessment.

Thank you as always for your partnership in your students' education. I look forward to working together to keep increasing our scores, and most importantly, our student outcomes.

DISTRICT UPDATES

REBUILDING PROVIDENCE PUBLIC SCHOOLS

For the first time ever, Providence has over \$500 million to invest in modernizing our public school buildings. This is an opportunity to re-shape the District and create 21st century learning environments for students and educators. Community feedback is critical to a successful use of these funds, so PPSD has held several community engagement sessions, with two more coming up next week. These virtual sessions will be held on Zoom on Monday, December 5, and Thursday, December 8, both from 6 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. If you can't attend, one of these virtual sessions will be recorded and posted on the PPSD website, and you can use the Community Feedback section on www.rebuildpvdschools.com to submit your questions or comments.

EARLY RELEASE DECEMBER 14

This is a friendly reminder that all schools will have their next monthly two-hour early dismissal on Wednesday, December 14, for teacher professional development. Middle school families should note that this is different from the regular

Wednesday dismissal time for middle school students. Middle schools will be dismissed at 12:40 p.m. on December 14, to allow buses to run on time for other schools that are also dismissed early that day. Families should also remember to double check the schedules at local recreation centers, as some may not open until 3 p.m. because of staffing.

What made you want to teach third grade?

I love third grade! It's that cusp year - the students are independent but they still need you. It's the year they're really starting to apply their knowledge of reading, and they transition from learning to read to reading to learn. Exciting things start happening when they learn new skills and can apply the evidence. I like it because it's also that year where you start to identify kids that may need more support so you can help set them up for success.

How do you describe your job to people who don't work in education?

As a teacher you have to be ready as soon as the kids come in. In some jobs you can ease into the day, but here you have 26 kids looking to you for the energy you come in with. You don't know what the students are coming in with, so it's important to always check in with them during morning circle. It's not a job you can do unprepared. The planning

and preparation part of my job is done outside of work. Last night I was correcting tests and today we went over them to learn how to use our strategies more effectively. All my analysis, reflections and strategy comes after school - what worked well, what could be better? I'm always going over that in my mind and trying to improve my practice.

What do you wish more people knew about being a teacher?

For me, it's that futures are in my hands. If students don't get these skills and strategies before they leave third grade, they're not set up for success. I enjoy my job and I have fun, but I know how important it is. This is the foundation for the rest of their life.

I struggled learning as a student myself, and I spoke a second

language and I see myself in my students. My focus is to have my kids love learning and know it's okay to make mistakes. When we make mistakes and understand where we went wrong, that's how we build new learning. It's so important to build a growth mindset, have them learn to take chances, and take feedback from you. Those conversations are where you see the lightbulb go off, and that is one of the greatest rewards.

What have been some of the highlights this year so far?

You can see the effect COVID had on the class I have this year in terms of academics and social-emotional skills. We've been working really hard on routines, expectations and building

stamina. I feel like we're starting to turn a corner and that's been rewarding. The first couple months were hard, but we made a lot of growth together. It's great seeing a change in their ability to work now and how they're building that stamina to support meeting grade level expectations.

What are you looking forward to for the rest of the year?

Seeing my students grow, now that they're getting it. We look at data and scores together, and my students know what growth looks like. I'm a big believer in having my students take ownership of their education so they understand the importance and can begin to set goals for themselves.

I also love working with my colleagues! I couldn't do this job without them. Our administrative team is very supportive too. The work can be messy, but we're in here working as hard as we can to give our students the best education possible. We have some of the best teammates and teachers here in Providence. We bounce ideas off each other, plan together, and the community here at West is amazing.

This month, the PPSD Office of Student Support and the newly formed Department of Social Emotional Learning and Mental Health partnered with Bradley Hospital to support continued progress in building infrastructure that supports social emotional learning (SEL) and mental health across a multi-tiered system of supports (MTSS). Through PPSD's latest Project AWARE grant, a full-time coordinator will be hired to work alongside the Director of SEL and Mental Health, and School Psychology and School Social Worker Specialists. This new opportunity and partnership with Bradley Hospital will greatly benefit Providence youth, families, and schools by helping to advance progress in building mental health awareness, enhanced mental health literacy, and access to a continuum of mental and behavioral health services.
