Happy New Year to you all! I hope that you all had a joyous holiday with your family and friends, and have been settling back into the last half of the 2023-2024 school year. Attendance continues to be a focus for our school District all year. We appreciate our families hard work in encouraging our students to be in school. As a district, Providence Public Schools has seen an 18.1% reduction in chronic absenteeism compared to the same time last year.

The **Rhode Island Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (RIDE)** released school and district accountability ratings for the 2022-2023 academic school year. To see your child's school report card, please visit the RIDE website by clicking here.

For our 5th and 8th grade families: be on the lookout for the **school choice forms**, as they will be distributed to families the week of January 15 and are due back in early February. We are very excited for our families as they review the school options for next year.

We also want to remind families that the deadline to accept **Advanced Academic (AA)** school assignments is January 22, 2024. Middle School AA will be expanded to all six middle schools for the 2024-25 school year, where in the past this program has existed only at select Middle Schools. Families who opt out of AA or who do not accept school assignments will use the PPSD School Choice deadlines.

Kindergarten registration also begins February 20, 2024 so please help us spread the word on this important start date.

Let us start the new year off together with purpose, poise, and positive potential for success. Keep on coming to school and keep up the good work! **Remember, it is Cool to Be in School!**

FAFSA FOR 12TH GRADE STUDENTS

The **FAFSA application** is now available for current 12th grade students and parents in the District. Both students and parents will need their FSA ID log-in and other documents to complete the application.

Students and parents can also use the Rhody Ready Chat Bot, a free texting service that will provide messages to help them understand the new FAFSA rules, stay up to date on alerts, and submit the FAFSA application on time. The chatbot also provides reminders about important deadlines in the college application process.

The District will be holding a District FAFSA event on Tuesday, February 13, 2024 from 5:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. The event is for students and parents who have questions about FAFSA and need help completing it. Students and parents should also make an appointment with their school's school counselor to help get the process started. What makes your school unique?

Mount Pleasant is a unique high school for it is the first school in Providence that will have a real focus on college and career in specific pathways that have been selected by students. As the school was identified as a school to be redesigned, students, faculty, staff, and community spent a year to identify the areas of interest and flesh out the programs or pathways that will help students achieve their dreams.

Mount Pleasant is one of five redesign schools for next year. What programs/pathways will your school be offering?

We will be offering four different pathways: Computer Science, Pre-Engineering/Advanced Manufacturing, Teacher Academy, and Music.

What is your vision or goal for your student body for the 2023-24 school year at this time?

Since our vision is to work collaboratively with area state colleges, universities, and local industry partners in support of the growth of the whole student, so that they not only earn a high school diploma but also graduate with industry experience and college credits, our goal for the 2023-2024 school year is to create robust partnerships with Rhode Island College, URI, CCRI, and Providence College to ensure that our students have access to taking courses on their campuses. Additionally, we are strengthening our relationship with Electric Boat, Polaris, and other industry partners to design internships and work-based learning opportunities for our students. Finally, we are making sure our students understand the opportunities these pathways offer so that they can select the one they want to explore and hopefully be where they focus their attention as a career in the future.

What accomplishments have filled you with pride so far this year?

Three of our seniors have received Questbridge scholarships for \$350,000.00 each to Boston University and Smith College. I believe this is a first time occurrence in the city of Providence. Additionally, 48 of our juniors have been identified early to take dual enrollment courses at Rhode Island College next fall. They

have maintained their attendance above 90%, their math

and English SAT performance is either approaching or reaching benchmarks, and their grade point average is at or above a 3.2. We had our first meeting with them to communicate the news and will be reaching out to their parents and expressing how proud we are of their accomplishments. We have also recruited more than 80 students who were undecided about their career choice who have now chosen a CTE pathway. They will begin their first course at the start of our second semester. These are amazing accomplishments.

Does your school have a mascot or school colors? How does your school show school spirit?

Yes we do, and the colors are red and blue. We had a block parade when our band performed in the Mount Pleasant neighborhood. We had homecoming, school-wide athletic events, and big school-wide celebrations to acknowledge the hard work and the accomplishments of our students. In the spring there will be concerts, Six Flags trips, academic celebrations, talent shows, culture nights, and other events.

Is there anything else you would like us to share with the PPSD community?

We are building up a school of excellence where the best will reside. We are already seeing evidence that we are changing minds and hearts.

February 1, 2024


