FAFSA

The Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) is the form you need to fill out to get any financial aid from the federal government to help pay for college. Each year, over 13 million students who file the FAFSA get more than \$120 billion in grants, work-study, and low-interest loans from the U.S. Department of Education. It is free to complete and opens you up to financial opportunties for college. Please see your high school guidance counselor for additional details. Also, PPSD will be:

- Providing school hours including Saturdays for families to • complete FAFSA;
- Working with RI College Planning Center and RIOPC as well as OnWard We Learn, and ETS to support all FAFSA and alternative FAFSA completion efforts; and
- The Office of Family and Community Engagement is also available to collaborate with families and schools.

FINISH THE YEAR STRONG: ATTENDANCE

We're in the final stretch and we want to encourage all of our families and students to finish the year strong by attending every day! Before the pandemic, about 8 million U.S. students were considered chronically absent, according to the research group Attendance Works. A student is considered chronically absent if they miss 10% or more of the school year. The number of chronically absent students doubled to around 16 million in 2022. So let's all work together to be in school!

SURVEYWORKS RESULTS

At Young Woods Elementary School on Tuesday, Governor Dan McKee and Lieutenant Governor Sabina Matos ioined to **RIDE Commissioner Angélica Infante-Green** and Superintendent Javier Montañez to release the final results of SurveyWorks. Providence Public Schools results reported improvement in several key areas: grades 3-5 responded favorably to learning goals and strategies, and grades 6-12 found Individual Learning Plans (ILPs) useful for their college/

career readiness. Providence also had a higher rate of family engagement than the rest of the state, with an increase of families attending school events at their child's school.

What are your plans after high school?

SL: I'm going to continue to work. And I am going to RISD in the fall. I'm thinking about concentrating in sculpture or industrial design. 
LECLERC NAMED PPSD'S TEACHER OF THE YEAR
