SUPERINTENDENT'S CORNER

Hello PPSD family, and welcome to the latest edition of our bi-weekly newsletter! If you or someone you know misses one of these newsletters, you can find past editions on the PPSD website in multiple languages.

A key part of our community's Turnaround Action Plan for Providence Schools is to increase our percentage of fully staffed classrooms at the beginning of each school year. And with good reason – as a former PPSD teacher, assistant principal, and principal, I can tell you from experience that educators in a well-staffed school are more effective. And that helps our students thrive.

So I have pushed my team to take an aggressive approach on hiring for next school year. We have several new incentives to offer candidates, and we posted positions on March 7, which is well over a month earlier than normal.

And what a difference a month makes! As of today, we have already hired for 206 PTU positions next year. Here is a breakdown of those hires:

- 102 are educators who were previously displaced
- 53 are external hires and new to PPSD .
- 47 are educators moving to a new role or who were promoted
- 11 are substitutes who will be joining us full-time

We also currently have another 15 offers out to candidates. In short, we are miles ahead of where we were last year - because last year at this time we had barely started this process.

I fully understand that we are not done here. Staffing is a challenge in districts across the country, and it is a challenge that we must, and will, address. But we are making significant progress towards making sure our buildings are filled with high quality educators ready to help our students succeed.

Congratulations to our hardworking staff and students at Classical High School for once again being named one of the best public high schools in the country by U.S. News and World Report! The rankings were based on these measures: college readiness, college curriculum breadth, state assessment performance, state assessment proficiency, reading and math proficiency, reading and math performance, underserved student performance, and graduation rates.

I can direct them to the activities or resources they need. My favorite thing to tell students is that education is the key - once you have it, no one can take it away from you.

What do you wish more people knew about your job or PPSD in general?

I would tell people - don't believe everything you hear on TV. Come into the schools and get to know the kids. We have great students and great teachers in PPSD. The negativity is so sad. I wish people in the community understood what the day-to-day is like in the schools and how rewarding it is being in a classroom, in a school.

What's an obstacle your students overcame this year that you're proud of?

I would say how they communicate with each other. It was a real challenge after distance learning and with masks. Now I see them form groups where they're working together, playing together, talking with each other and just being happy, being kids. And when they're in that mindset they can connect with teachers easier and we can talk about something - that's so important.
