



Fred is a certified therapy dog, and he and Ms. Vessella have gone through extensive training and credentialing through the Windwalker Professional Pet Assisted Therapy program. Dogs go through temperament testing and live training at a nursing home for both the guardian and the animal. Fred also has professional liability insurance. According to the American Kennel Club, "therapy dogs provide relief to those in anxiety-provoking situations, bring comfort to those who are grieving or lonely, and offer affection to humans who are in institutions such as schools." So, we thought it would be fun to hear about Fred's job from his point of view, with a little help from his "mom," Ms. Vessella! What made you want to be a therapy dog?


