SUPERINTENDENT'S CORNER

Welcome to the latest edition of the Providence Public School District (PPSD) bi-weekly newsletter! If you or someone you know misses any of our newsletters, you can find past editions on the PPSD website in multiple languages.

When you're on a long or challenging path, it's important to stop every now and then to acknowledge your progress. Your goal might still be far away, but it's a lot closer than when you started. I was reminded of this as I reviewed mid-year assessments for PPSD students in grades K through 8. We have made serious progress this year in math, English Language Arts (ELA), and reading:

- In math, we had an average of 21% more K-8 students meet or partially meet expectations for their grade level, compared to the beginning of this school year.
- In ELA, we started the year with just 10% of K-8 students meeting or exceeding • expectations for their grade level. By mid-year assessments, we more than tripled that number to 35% of students meeting or exceeding expectations.
- Grades 1 through 8 have all met or exceeded their independent reading growth goals for this point in the school year. Kindergarten increased their reading growth rate by about 33% compared to last year at this time.

Is the job done? Of course not. We want ALL students meet or exceed grade level. But these mid-year assessments show we are building momentum in the right direction. I think it's important that we celebrate our hardworking teachers and students for the progress they've made during this incredibly challenging school year.

I encourage everyone to acknowledge small wins like this as we work to turn PPSD around. It lets our teachers and students know their work is important, appreciated, and seen. That will help motivate and encourage our team so we can keep building this positive momentum. And pretty soon we'll look up and see all of these small wins have stacked up into a big change in Providence.

DISTRICT UPDATES PRINCIPAL OF THE YEAR

Congratulations to Classical High School Principal Scott Barr for being named the 2022 Rhode Island Principal of the Year by the Rhode Island Association of School Principals! Principal Barr began his career 32 years ago working in Providence Public Schools as a history teacher. Eventually he became the department chair at Classical High School. After a move to administrative leadership as an assistant principal at Cranston East High School, Barr returned to Providence to serve Classical as its 16th principal. Under his leadership, Classical has received numerous awards and is consistently ranked among the best public schools in the state and the entire country.

SKILLS USA COMPETITION

Providence Career and Technical Academy (PCTA) had 89 students compete in our state SkillsUSA competition this year. SkillsUSA is a nationwide career and technical student organization serving nearly 400,000 high school, college, and middle school students enrolled in training programs in trade, technical, and skilled service occupations. Our students received 34 medals in this year's competition, including 18 gold, 9 silver, and 7 bronze! Our 18 gold medalists will be part of the State Champion SkillsUSA delegation representing the State of Rhode Island at the National SkillsUSA competition in Atlanta this June.

I have students multiplying, doing long division, and doing fractions

with confidence now and they couldn't do any of that at the start of the year. But they worked hard and mastered it!

What do you wish more people knew about being a teacher?

Being an Educator is a lot of work, but it is rewarding every single day. I support students

who are learning disabled and have gaps in reading, writing, and math. Today I had five students who took a math test and I could see they felt confident and good about themselves. That's huge! I have to give props to D'Abate Elementary for creating such a good culture for learning in the school. The entire community here works extremely hard and it's great to see the connection and commitment towards each individual student and their families. This type of dedication to the community gets the kids motivated and in turn they truly buy-in and put in the work!

What did it mean to be named the 2022 Rhode Island Interscholastic League Male Coach of the Year, across all sports?

I'm a dad and I love that title the most. However, Coach is the second best title to have, in my opinion. As a Coach, I am able to guide students in the right direction, keep them focused & motivated, and provide them with the best opportunities possible. I owe this award to all the students and coaches I've worked with over the past 18 years. I was fortunate to take over a wrestling program at Hope 13 years ago that had 6 kids. My first year, we brought in 44 kids and were co-division champions. Hope is the only Division 1 school in Providence for wrestling. This year we were third in the state as a team, we had 2 State Champions, 2 Finalists, had a young man who placed at New Englands, and high school nationals.

> But the thing I'm proudest of and the thing that sets the tone for everything is our focus on academics. We have a 100% graduation rate and over the past eight years, 100% of our kids have ventured on to college and many have continued to wrestle in college. That's special. To know where they come from, the adversity they've had to face and to overcome all of that and still be successful is huge for our wrestling community.

Our Blue Wave Wrestlers are also able to give back and coach at our middle schools here in Providence and they have also started 3 businesses which I am extremely proud of: Wavy Lawn Care, Wavy Bounce Inflatables and Party Rentals, and Wavy Trucking. All three are named after the Hope "Blue Wave" mascot. We push our student-athletes to be their best and I am proud of the fact that they continue to do so even after becoming an alumnus. As Educators, that's the impact we HOPE to have.
