Happy March to all of our students, families, and Providence Public School District (PPSD) team. While the weather may still be cold and blustery, before we know it we will be lining our seniors up for graduation. February was a short and busy month and Providence Public Schools has a lot in store for this March.

SurveyWorks has begun! I want to encourage all of our students, faculty, and especially families to fill this out, it is one of our Turnaround Action Plan (TAP) metrics which we exceeded last year. We want to continue that momentum into this year, it's so important that we understand the perception of what is happening at our schools. SurveyWorks is a powerful tool because it gives everyone a voice, and provides us the feedback we need to make informed decisions. Engaging our community is a cornerstone of the turnaround plan in Providence.

Kindergarten registration began on February 20 and we want to encourage our students and families to register early, so please help us spread the word on this important information.

During winter break, our elementary and middle school students took part in RICAS Academy while high school students attended SAT preparation classes. It was wonderful to see students


hard at work during school vacation, engaging in both classroom and small group activities. RICAS English Language Arts (ELA) testing begins April 1 and RICAS Math begins May 13. I am excited to see our students progress. At our high schools, students will be taking SATs beginning April 3. These are all important tests so be sure to work with students to prepare.

Attendance continues to be a focus for our school District and the state. We would like to acknowledge some of our student **attendance Superheroes**. So far this year, 6,800 students have been in school 95% of the time or better. 11,900 students have been in school 90% of the time or better. Let's take a moment to applaud the almost 12,000 success stories behind these statistics. There is no metric for grit and determination, but these students personify it.

Read Across America Week is March 2 to 6. Each year, it begins on the birthday of Dr. Seuss. Join the celebration and share your love of reading to your friends and family. We will also be celebrating **Social Work Week** March 3-9 and it is **Women's History Month**. I encourage you to reflect and celebrate the impact of so many to our rich community.

The **Kindergarten Lottery Registration** began on Tuesday, February 20th. BROWN COLLEGIATE SCHOLARS PROGRAM

The Brown University Collegiate Scholars Program application is now open! The Brown Collegiate Scholar Program provides college access to a cohort of PPSD students, and features a range of programming that builds confidence, skills, and academic proficiency in four areas: college access, academic support, youth development, and social emotional learning. To complete the application, students must submit a form providing information about the student and their parents/guardians, a 250- to 500- word essay responding to a prompt in the application, the student's report cards for sixth, seventh, and eighth grade, and a recommendation form filled out by a teacher, counselor, or another administrator in the student's school. FIVE NEW FOOD PANTRIES IN PPSD

In February, **PPSD**, **RIDE**, the **Papitto Opportunity Connection**, and **We Share Hope** officially announced the opening of five new food pantries in the District, marking a significant milestone in ongoing efforts to address food insecurity and Support families in need.

The new pantries, making eight in total for the District, are part of the "Feed the Future" School Food Pantry Program, where We Share Hope provides schools with the infrastructure to create and host its own on-site food pantry. This includes appliances, shelving, and biweekly food deliveries.

The Papitto Opportunity Connection generously committed \$150,000.00 in support of the new pantries over the next three years, making it possible to open the five new pantries. Gil's Appliances donated the refrigerators and freezers for each pantry.

These pantries are five of eight that run in collaboration with We Share Hope. There are also pantries at other schools started by faculty including one of the early food pantries at Veazie Street Elementary. This pantry was started by Central High School teacher Marcia Ranglin-Vassell, M.Ed in 2017.

We are grateful to all partners, volunteers, and community members who contributed to the success of this initiative.



MS. VOCKE'S TRANSITION STORE

Ms. Vocke's **Students Transition to Adult Readiness (STAR)** Class has a school store to embed life skills instructions. The students are provided a weekly "paycheck" where students have to pay bills for the month, budget their checking and saving accounts at "Maiorisi Bank" and the students can buy items at the classroom store. Recently, the class was excited for new items in stock at the classroom store that were made possible through a PPSD Equity Office grant. The grant provided the transition program with the opportunity to create meaningful and engaging incentives for their adult transition students. The students did a great job utilizing budgeting and math problem solving skills!

Students Transition to Adult Readiness (STAR) offers instruction in the skill areas of vocational, social, recreational, and independent living activities within the greater Providence community and Rhode Island as a whole. Using web-based learning, all students participate in activities that support growth in workplace skills, self-advocacy, setting goals and achieving goals, travel training and responsible citizenship. STAR provides experiences in all aspects of adult life in the community exposing the young adults to activities that present themselves in a typical year.

RESPECT, STUDENT EQUITY LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE


February 1, 2024
