COURSE OVERVIEW:

Welcome to Intro to Literature! This is the first of four English classes that you will take at PCTA. This course is designed to strengthen your critical thinking, reading, writing, and speaking skills. You will read various


types of literature, all of which you will deeply and richly analyze. You will engage in small-group and whole-class discussions. You will write both expository and creative pieces. This course will not only make you a stronger reader, writer, and thinker -- it will make you a stronger speaker and active listener as well.

EXPECTATIONS:

- **BE PREPARED:** It is expected that you come to class fully **prepared**, complemented by a **positive attitude**.
- **BE ENGAGED**: You are expected to keep up with all assignments both in and out of class so that you can best **engage** with the material and with your classmates.
- **BE PROACTIVE**: If you fall behind, feel lost, or miss a lesson, it is your job to reach out for help and to catch up. This is called **self-advocacy**.
- **BE PRESENT**: You are expected to keep your **phone stored away** for the entirety of the class period. You are expected to be on time for class and to be focused throughout the period.
- **BE RESPECTFUL:** You are expected to show **respect** to your classmates, your instructors, the material of each unit, the classroom itself, and to yourself.

MATERIALS:

GRADING POLICY:

Plagiarism defrauds the instructor with a false view of a student's strengths and weaknesses. It may prevent further instruction in areas of weakness and delay the student in reaching his or her potential.

№ Plagiarism includes:

- Taking someone else's assignment or portion of an assignment and submitting it as one's own
- Submitting material written by someone else or rephrasing the ideas of another without giving the author's name or source.
- Presenting the work of tutors, parents, siblings, or friends as one's own.
- Submitting purchased papers as one's own.
- Submitting papers from the Internet written by someone else as one's own.

• Supporting plagiarism by providing work to others, whether it is believed it will be copied or not.

Consequences:

At the discretion of the teacher, students involved in plagiarism will receive one or all of the consequences listed below:

- Receive 0 for the assigned work
- Receive an alternative assignment based on the same concepts
- Participate in a meeting with the teacher, administrator and parent
- Complete equivalent time in detention

These consequences are for students who plagiarize or cheat as well as for students who provide, assist, or support the student ("PCTA_cheating_policy").

To encourage academic integrity, all ELA papers are sent through an online Plagiarism tracker. We're not doing this to punish students, but to ensure that you're learning. School isn't about getting the right answer every single time, it's about the learning process and how each individual student gets there! I personally would rather have a student hand in a paper that needs a lot of work, than a student who copies from someone! I have not plagiarized here because I have a parenthetical citation and a works cited! (More on that later in the year woohoo!)
